Refreshed CONTEST Strategy

CONTEST is the Government's counterterrorism strategy. It's aim is to reduce the risk to the UK and threats from overseas. In July, the government launched a refreshed approach to the CONTEST strategy. If you would like to read more on the new strategy you can find more information here.

Andrew Tate arrest

In June, Andrew Tate was charged and placed under house arrest. Andrew Tate has been described as the "King of Toxic Masculinity" and has influenced the behaviours of young people in our communities. We have created a new and free training package on "The Manosphere and The Incel Movement" which goes into more detail on this topic. Martyn's Law update

Martyn's Law is a bill going through legislatice processes that will require venues and publicly accessible locations to implement appropriate security and mitigation measures against the threat of terrorism. In May the Government published the draft Terrorism of Premises) (Protection Bill aka Martyn's Law for pre-legislative scrutiny. Although there isn't a date for the introduction of Martyn's Law we advise that you use the following link to learn about who it will apply to and what the requirements will be when the new legislation is put in place.

PROFESSIONAL CURIOSITY

Look Further, Think Wider, See More

What is it?

Professional curiosity involves a practitioner who actively seeks to understand what is happening with a family or individual, rather than relying on assumptions or accepting information without scrutiny. It entails various aspects, such as challenging professional assumptions, incorporating information from multiple sources to gain a more profound insight, which aids in making informed predictions about future outcomes. Additionally, it involves going beyond the surface and questioning apparent observations. In essence, it encompasses a holistic approach, combining observation, attentive listening, direct inquiries, verification, and thoughtful contemplation of all the information received.

Why is it important?

Professional curiosity is important because it helps practioners understand the context of a situation in order to make an informed decision. It also helps build relationships with individuals by exploring their wishes, views, experiences whilst showing that you are listening. Some people may lack confidence or be unable to speak for themselves. Being professionally curious is important because it gives them an opportunity to communicate. Ultimately by being curious, persistant, proactive and working together, it helps keep people safe.



If you're worried that you or someone you know is being radicalised, our Prevent team can help. We support vulnerable people from being drawn into extremist or terrorist behaviour. You can also <u>visit Act Early for help</u>, <u>support and advice on preventing radicalisation</u>

Call or email us and we'll discuss your concerns with you. We will ask you why you think someone is at risk and decide how we can help. We may ask you to complete a referral form so that we can support the person you're worried about.
